Cahills Print Factory - Motion in the name of Councillor Claire O'Regan

1. To ask the Parks Division and the Derelict Sites Section for an update on the three derelict buildings at the top of Church Road, East Wall (Cahills print factory, the building adjacent to it and the building across the road from that, previously raised in Area Committee questions), and to ask the Parks Division for an update on planting trees in East Wall. This greening was promised in the 2004 Area Development Plan and never delivered.

Report: Cahills Print Factory, 119 – 122 Church Road

The Derelict Sites Section have written to the owners of Cahills Print Factory requesting them to carry out certain works to prevent the site from becoming derelict and allowing them a certain length of time to do the works. The Site is due for reinspection at the end of July where formal action maybe considered under the Derelict Sites Act if there is no improvement in the site.

118 Church Road

Following completion of improvement works at 118 Church Road, the site was removed from the Derelict Sites Register in 2008. The Derelict Sites Section will now arrange to inspect the site and report directly to the councillor.

130 Church Road

This site was inspected on 4th June 2009. The works requested by the Derelict Sites Section has been completed by the owner and no further action was required under the Derelict Sites Act 1990 at that time. The Derelict Sites Section will however carry out another inspection of the site and report directly to the councillor.

The Parks and Landscape Services Division are currently surveying locations in the Central Area that may be suitable for planting in the 2009/10 Street Tree Planting Programme of Works and the East Wall area is included in the survey. When the survey is complete this Division shall notify the Council members by way of report, listing both the locations

and type of tree

Shelmalier Road

2. Councillor Claire O'Regan To ask the Manager if a shore can be put in the keyhole part of Shelmalier Road, East Wall, Dublin 3 to assist with drainage.

Reply:

Road Maintenance inspected the above location and noted that there is no sewer near the keyhole, making the addition of a gully too costly. However, we will monitor the location in rainy conditions to see if removing a section of footpath will prove effective.

Restoration of Playground at Fairview Park

Can Dublin City Council give a complete update regarding the restoration of the playground in Fairview Park, including facts, figures, plans etc?...The playground should be restored as a matter of urgency.

Reply:

The Parks and Landscape Services Division has proposals for the placement of permanent playground at Fairview Park. Discussions are still ongoing between Dublin City Council and the National Roads Authority regarding the amount and timing of any compensation from that authority to the Parks and Landscape Services Division associated with the impacts of the Dublin Port Tunnel Project Works on Fairview Park. Therefore, this Division is currently not in a position to advise of a date when the permanent playground development will commence. In the meantime, the Parks and Landscape Services Division will continue to maintain the two temporary playgrounds that have been in place since the commencement of the Dublin Port Tunnel works in Fairview Park.
